COOL THOUGHTS

Pope Francis told a group of priests, "Please be great forgivers. It does me good to recall a Friar in Buenos Aires who was a 'great forgiver'. He is almost my age and sometimes he is gripped by scruples for having forgiven too much. One day I asked him, 'What do you do when you are gripped by these scruples?' He replied 'I go to the chapel and say, Lord forgive me, today I forgave too much. But let it be clear that you gave me this example!'."

Of course, as priests do, so should members of the community of believers do to others? Francis has written, "Let the church always be a place of mercy and hope for everyone is welcomed, loved and forgiven." These are words that re challenging and comforting to those who receive them in faith.

In the year of Year of Mercy we might want to consider integrating prayers of mercy in our daily reflection and communication with God. Here's a prayer that touched my heart!

O Lord. May the greatest of all divine attributes, that of Your unfathomable mercy, pass through my heart and soul to my neighbor.

Help me, O Lord, that my eyes may be merciful, so that I may never suspect or judge from appearances, but look for what is beautiful in my neighbors' souls and come to their rescue.

Help me, that my ears may be merciful, so that I may give heed to my neighbors' needs and not be indifferent to their pains and sufferings.

Help me, O Lord, that my tongue may be merciful, so that I should never speak negatively of my neighbor, but have a word of comfort and forgiveness for all.

Help me, O Lord, that my hands may be merciful and filled with good deeds, so that I may do only good to my neighbors and take upon myself the more difficult and toilsome tasks.

Help me, that my feet may be merciful, so that I may hurry to assist my neighbor, overcoming my own fatigue and weariness. My true rest is in the service of my neighbor.

Help me, O Lord, that my heart may be merciful so that I will refuse my heart to no one; be sincere even with those who, I know, will abuse my kindness. I will bear my own suffering in silence. May Your mercy, O Lord, rest upon me.

Help me, O Lord that when I cannot carry out a work of mercy, I will assist by my words, and if I cannot show mercy by deeds or words, that I can always do so by prayer. O Jesus, transform me into Yourself, for You can do all things. AMEN.
